Rotary President-elect Sam F. Owori dies

Rotary International President-elect Sam F. Owori died unexpectedly on 13 July due to complications from surgery. Sam was a member of the Rotary Club Kampala, Uganda, for 38 years. Rotary President-elect Sam F. Owori died Thursday, 13 July.

"Rotary has become a way of life for me – with the intrinsic value and core belief in mutual responsibility and concern for one another as a cornerstone," Sam said when he was nominated last year. "I feel immense satisfaction knowing that through Rotary, I've helped someone live better. "

Sam's term as Rotary's 108th president would have begun on 1 July 2018.

"Please remember Sam as the outstanding, hardworking Rotarian he was," said Rotary International President Ian Riseley. "In this difficult time, I ask you to keep his wife, Norah, the Owori family, and Sam's millions of friends around the world in your thoughts.



"Under Sam's leadership, the number of clubs in Uganda swelled from nine to 89 over the course of 29 years.

Sam saw in Rotary members "an incredible passion to make a difference," and wanted to "harness that enthusiasm and pride so that every project becomes the engine of peace and prosperity.

"Sam was the chief executive officer of the Institute of Corporate Governance of Uganda, whose mission is to promote excellence in corporate governance principles and practice in the region by 2020. Previously, he was executive director of the African Development Bank, managing director of Uganda Commercial Bank Ltd., and director of Uganda Development Bank. He has also served as corporate secretary of the Central Bank of Uganda.

He served as member and chair of several boards including FAULU (U) Ltd., (now Opportunity Bank), the Uganda Heart Institute, the Centre for African Family Studies, Mulago Hospital Complex, Mukono Theological College, and the Kampala City Council. Sam also was the vice chair of Hospice Africa Uganda, and board member and chair of the Audit Committee of PACE (Programme for Accessible Health, Communication, and Education) in Uganda "Sam was a special person in so many ways, and his unexpected death is a huge loss to Rotary, his community, and the world," Riseley said. "We are establishing details on plans to celebrate his life as they become available."

Dear fellow Rotarians,

There has been an outpouring of heartfelt messages since President-elect Sam's passing last week. Rotarians and members of the public have been sharing memories and recalling how Sam inspired them through his hard work as a Rotarian and as a dedicated civil servant. It is clear that his impact and legacy were felt worldwide.

There will be a service for Sam on Friday, 21 July, from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m., at St. Vincent's Cathedral in Bedford, Texas. Friends in the area are encouraged to visit. Funeral services in Uganda are currently being planned.

Memorial contributions in honour of Sam will be directed to the Sam F. Owori Memorial to Polio. This fund has been established to honour his commitment to Rotary's polio eradication efforts. Sam was a member of both the Africa Regional Polio Plus Committee and the International Polio Plus Committee. Dear fellow Rotarians,

For many years, one idea has stood at the heart of all our service: sustainability. Sustainable service means our work continues to have a positive impact long after Rotary's direct involvement has ended. We don't dig wells and walk away; we make sure communities can maintain and repair those wells. If we build a clinic, we make sure that clinic has a way to keep running without ongoing support from us.

One way I'd like for you to contribute in our quest for sustainability is through my tree planting initiative. I ask that you have one tree planted for each member of your club sometime between now and Earth Day, 22 April 2018. The [Environmental Sustainability Rotarian Action Group](#) is a [great resource](#) that can help you get started. Share your progress online by using #pledgetoplant.

I hope that the result of this effort will be far greater than the environmental benefit that those 1.2 million new trees will bring, which is itself most worthwhile. I believe the greater result will be a Rotary that recognizes our responsibility, not only to the people on our planet—but to the planet itself on which we all live and on which we all depend.

During my six presidential conferences this year, environmental sustainability is one of many topics up for discussion. Each conference will focus on how peace relates to one of Rotary's five other areas of focus. My hope is that attendees are inspired take action after attending a conference and will develop new initiatives. [Learn more](#) about each of the conferences and [how to register](#).

As I mentioned to you all earlier this year, Rotary Peace Fellow Marie-Paule Attema has already begun her studies and has shared her first blog post, which you can read [here](#). I'm pleased to report that my home country of Australia has welcomed her with open arms and we all look forward to reading her next post as her journey progresses.

Beginning this Rotary year, the [Rotary Friendship Exchange](#) program has been expanded to include both Rotarians and non-Rotarians, with an emphasis on including young professionals on exchanges. These exchanges are a unique chance for cultural immersion and interchange, as well as an opportunity to build global understanding and boost vocational and leadership skills.

In addition, at least four club goals must be achieved in the following categories: support and strengthen clubs, focus and increase humanitarian service, and enhance Rotary's public image and awareness. Club's first trans leader steps up



Outgoing Queenstown Rotary president Keith McIntosh hands the chains of office to Monica Mulholland.



The new transgender president of Rotary Club of Queenstown has thanked the man she used to be as she takes office.

Monica Mulholland made national news last May when she was nominated as the club's president-elect, two months after coming out as a woman.

At Tuesday's changeover night in Queenstown, she thanked her former self "for the trials and tribulations that he's been put through".

She likened him to a booster rocket - "his job was done and he fell away".

Ms Mulholland also singled out her wife, Joan Kiernan, who became the club's first woman president in 2006.

She said a transgender woman, ex-president of another Rotary club, had been her pathfinder.

"Without her, I probably wouldn't have been here today."

Also singled out for their understanding were Jan Chappell, who was local Rotary president when Ms Mulholland announced her transition, and then president-elect Keith McIntosh

Ms Chappell had said: "If the members do not accept you, I'll resign myself". Ms Mulholland said "that was a turning point for me - thank you."

A wealth management adviser who grew up in County Cork, the eldest of nine children, Ms Mulholland settled in Queenstown in 2001.

Her agenda for the next year is to connect and inspire.

"We will spend more time away from the traditional structure of having a meal and a lecture, and engage far more in activities which promote fellowship and friendship. We're also going to connect more with our community."

Queenstown's accepting stance jars with that of Rotary's Avonhead club in Christchurch, which does not accept women members.

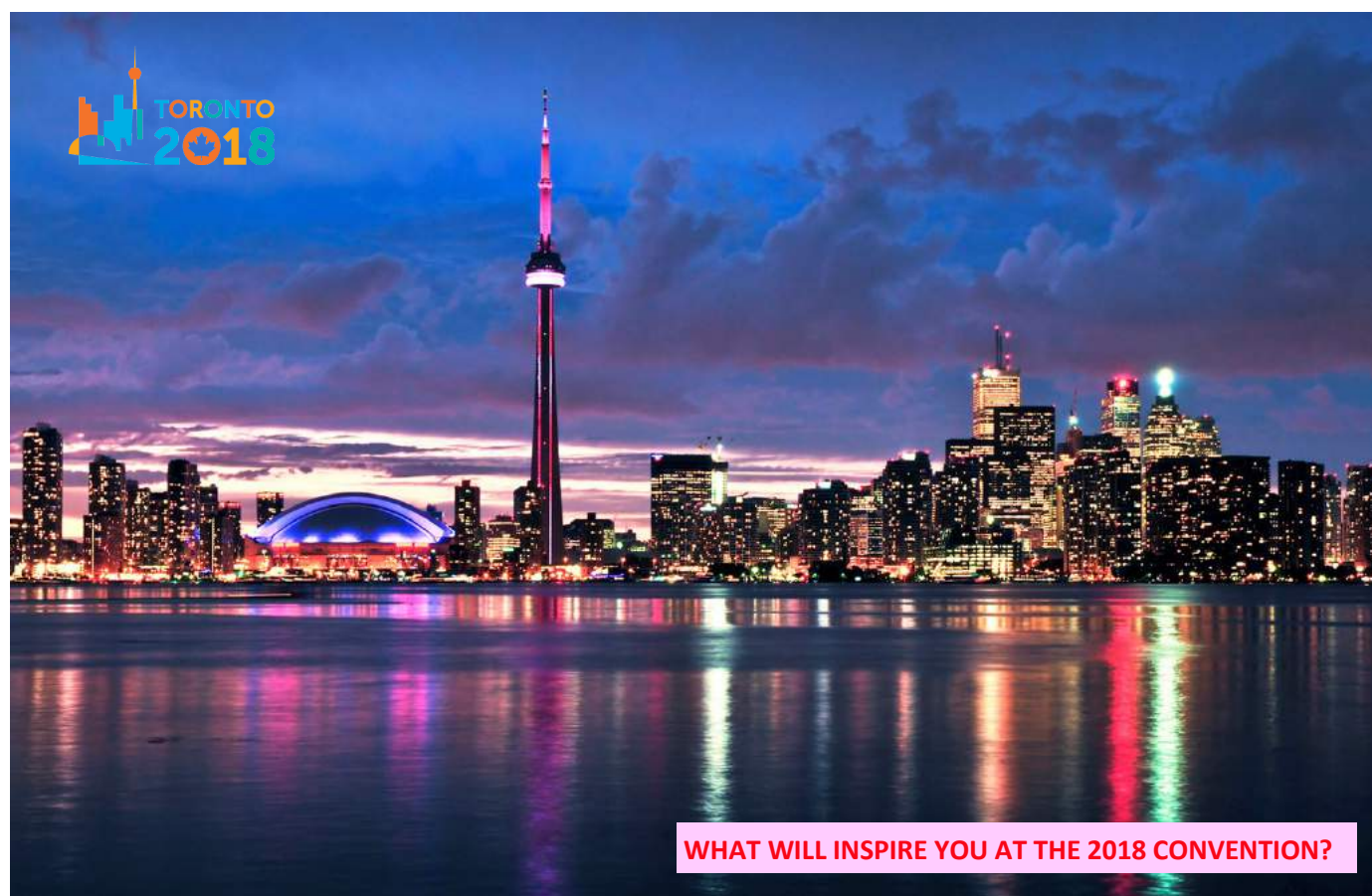

Whangaparaoa Club Selected News Items

Guest Speaker

Geoff Mathis is past District Governor of District 9930 and I heard someone say he was a "member" of Sean Leightons Club, actually Geoff says Sean is a member of Geoff's Club.

Geoff gave us a very good talk on the work he and his team have done with Rotary in Mwika Village, Tanzania from 2008 to the present and this will be ongoing. Mwika village is at 1800 metres altitude on the foothills of Mount Kilimanjaro.

Geoff's background is in farming and a need was identified to help improve farming methods in Mwika and started off with making bio digesters using cow manure to provide gas in the home for cooking but even with gas in the home many villagers still prefer to cook on the charcoal outside.

Moving on from bio digesters Geoff has been involved in improving animal feeding methods from brown feed to green feed to improve milk yields and this gave an improvement from 7.7lts per cow per day to 23lts per cow per day increasing income by \$9.30 per day.

This then needed better milk handling methods with the improvements including new stainless steel milk buckets instead of paint buckets to carry the milk and a stainless steel milk plant to process the milk.

In 2015 this project was successful in obtaining support from NZ Aid to the sum of \$380,000 with Global grant of \$280,000 and Rotary donations of \$50,000 and this will go to new plant, more bio digesters, more milk cans and replacement cows.

Hibiscus Hospice Fundraiser

This year's legends-Best of British evening is set to be a 'right old knees up' with high calibre cover artists Joe Cocker, Freddie Mercury and the Bee Gees taking the stage in what promises to be a fun evening filled with dancing, entertainment and fantastic music.

Whangaparaoa Rotary gave \$500 towards Finn's travel costs to the junior commonwealth games. Below is a note from his parents with the latest information.

He is expected to bring home at least 1 medal in backstroke and will be bringing the medals to a meeting. Finn lives with his parents at Arkles Bay.

"Finn set off today for his staging camp at Millennium, which started with a media event.

He was interviewed for 3 News, as he is a possible Commonwealth Games (next year) qualifier and a medal hopeful.

He flies to the Bahamas on Thursday and his first race is on Tuesday.

Unfortunately we have been told there is no live streaming of the event.

We will look online (along with many other parents) and see if we can find a feed from the Bahama.
